### Who Were Civil War Zouaves? – July 11

Civil War zouaves were soldiers whose appearance and fighting style were inspired by French North African regiments



of the same name. Civil War reenactor Rob Kufrovich will introduce you to the uniform, equipment, and everyday experiences of a zouave soldier. You'll handle reproduction artifacts and even have a chance to explore a Civil War soldier's tent!

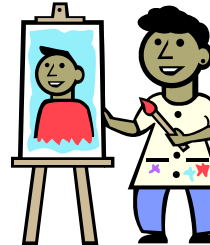
### Remembering Gettysburg – July 18

Explore the battle of Gettysburg through the eyes of a zouave soldier. Afterward, learn about hardtack, a mixture of flour and water hardened to a rocklike consistency. Discover why soldiers often ate this teeth shattering cracker, and make your own hardtack dough to take home!



### A Portrait Tells a Story, Part 1 – July 25

Bring the family to the Wilson Museum for the first part of a two-day portrait painting workshop. Watch a demonstration with artist Elise Andréa and begin to “tell” your own story through an introductory drawing lesson.



### A Portrait Tells a Story, Part 2 – August 1

Join artist Elise Andréa for her second portrait painting workshop. Watch a demonstration, and then put paint to paper and create your own portrait. Whether you came to the first workshop or not, we want you there!



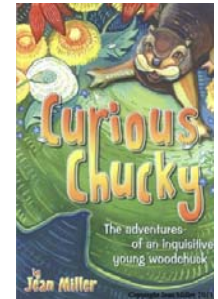
### Cave Art – August 8

Learn about the evolution of artistic expression from *Homo erectus* to *Homo sapiens*, view stone tools that are nearly 500,000 years old, and create a replica cave painting!



### Curious Chucky – August 15

Author Jean Miller and illustrator David Dolittle have written a picture book about an inquisitive young woodchuck named Chucky. Curious? If so, come listen to the story *Curious Chucky*, meet the author, and enjoy a book-themed activity.



### Follow the Drinking Gourd – August 22

The drinking Gourd is another name for the big dipper, a beacon for slaves escaping from the south in the nineteenth century. Listen to the story “Follow the Drinking Gourd,” a tale about an abolitionist named Peg Leg Joe and the song he teaches to slaves. Following the reading, handle objects similar to those used by slaves and enjoy a CD of slave lullabies.
